MINUTES - Draft

1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 6:04 p.m.

2. APPROVE DRAFT MINUTES

The minutes from the September 15, 2020 Burien Airport Committee (BAC) meeting were approved. It was requested that after discussion of agenda items, any action items be specifically listed in the minutes; and the draft minutes be provided to the Committee members about a week after the meeting.

3. BUSINESS AGENDA

a) Discuss direction from Burien City Council on exploration of airport roundtables in other cities.

i. Review criteria in draft matrix exploring other airport roundtables.

At the September 21, 2020 Burien Council meeting, the Council directed the Burien Airport Committee to examine successful airport roundtables nationwide and bring back possible structural changes to ensure worthwhile community participation no later than December 31, 2020. Discussion occurred on what criteria are important and the difficulty of determining if that roundtable is effective. The possibility of having an alternative forum, such as the Highline Forum, was discussed, but restructuring would be needed.

ii. Identify additional roundtables to examine. The Burien Airport Committee members were tasked with researching various roundtables to help complete the comparison chart started by Chair Tosta. A suggestion was to virtually attend the meetings of those roundtables. <u>ACTION</u>: The following Committee members agreed to research the listed airport roundtables:

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Chair Tosta – Chicago O'Hare; and to get roundtable information previously gathered by Sheila Brush and JC Harris. Jeff Harbaugh - Reagan National Airport, near D.C. Debi Wagner – Boston and Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) Javier Tordable – May be assigned one if a roundtable contact can be provided.

b) Discuss next steps for SeaTac Airport Stakeholder Advisory Round Table (StART).

Since the Burien City Council directed Burien to rejoin StART, City Manager Wilson has attended a StART meeting and both the federal policy and noise working group meetings. He has seen Port of Seattle support in addressing some of the requested changes to the meetings. The process to appoint the two Burien community representatives to StART is underway.

c) Discuss Interlocal Agreement for 5 cities to work with University of Washington on "School Resilience to Air Pollution" Study.

The Burien Airport Committee supports the City's participation and funding of \$12,500 for the Interlocal Agreement related to the University of Washington "School Resilience to Air Pollution" study.

d) Discuss 2021 Federal Legislative Priorities.

The Committee reviewed Burien's proposed 2021 Federal Legislative Priorities. <u>ACTION:</u> Proposed changes to Burien's 2021 Federal Legislative Priorities to provide to Council include the following:

Reduce Airport Noise and Emissions:

- Promoting and supporting a regional "Coalition of Electeds" ... This bullet was proposed to be deleted since was suggested over a year ago and is no longer relevant.
- Support HR 2351, known as the Aviation Impacted Communities Act... HR 2351 is an incorrect bill number and should be corrected to HR 6038.

Climate Action

• Add a bullet related to strengthening aviation greenhouse gas emissions legislation.

The Committee reviewed Burien's proposed 2021 State Legislative Agenda and discussed a 2021 State Budget Provision related to purchasing and outfitting a van to do mobile air quality monitoring.

<u>ACTION:</u> City Manager Wilson will contact the City's State Lobbyist about adding language to Burien's proposed 2021 State Legislative Agenda on the mobile van to do air quality monitoring.

e) Report on meetings with Congressmen Adam Smith and Rick Larsen.

Chair Tosta has met with Congressmen Smith and Larsen and they have been responsive to the City's airport noise concerns.

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f) Other items?

The Committee discussed sending a letter to the Port of Seattle on the increasing flights over Burien. The Committee was reminded that impacts should be addressed during the SAMP process, which is scheduled to occur in 1st quarter 2021, but may get extended. <u>ACTION:</u> Committee members Debi Wagner and Sharyn Parker will draft a letter to the Port for review at the next Burien Airport Committee meeting.

4. PUBLIC COMMENT

JC Harris – He has looked at other roundtables and recommended focusing on the desired changes. He was asked to provide his roundtable research to Chair Tosta to pass on to the Committee members.

5. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 7:34 p.m.

Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport Community Working Group Organizational Charter for 2017

The Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority serves as sponsor and facilitator for the Reagan National Airport Community Working Group, created in response to community concerns regarding aircraft noise affecting residential areas in the District of Columbia, Virginia and Maryland along the Potomac and Anacostia river flight corridors.

The Working Group includes community representatives from the Washington, D.C., communities of Georgetown/Foggy Bottom (Ward 2), Palisades/Foxhall (Ward 3), Southwest Waterfront/Navy Yard (Ward 6), Benning/Kenilworth/River Terrace (Ward 7) and Anacostia (Ward 8); from the Virginia communities of Crystal City and Rosslyn/North Arlington in Arlington County; the Old Town community in the City of Alexandria; and the Fairfax County Supervisor Districts of Dranesville and Mount Vernon; and from the Maryland communities of Bethesda; Potomac and Glen Echo/Cabin John in Montgomery County and the Accokeek and Fort Washington communities in Prince George's County. Appointing officials are the Mayors of Washington, D.C., and Alexandria, Virginia; the County Chairs of Fairfax and Arlington counties in Virginia; and the County Executives of Montgomery and Prince George's counties in Maryland, for communities in their jurisdictions. The Working Group's voting membership also includes two representatives of airlines serving Reagan National Airport.

The Working Group will be joined at its meetings by representatives of the Federal Aviation Administration, as needed for technical consultation, and airlines operating at Reagan National, as well as representatives of the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority and its Noise Information Office. Elected officials who selected the Working Group members, as well as members of the elected official's staff, also are welcome to attend Working Group meetings.

The Airports Authority convenes Working Group meetings and serves as facilitator for the group's meetings and its formulation of recommendations and will provide written summaries of meetings, to be approved by the Working Group membership and posted on the Airports Authority website, along with other key materials from meetings. The Airports Authority and FAA serve as non-voting advisory members of the Working Group, which conducts meetings using Robert's Rules of Order. The Working Group meets regularly to share ideas, discuss potential strategies and evaluate potential ways to mitigate the impact of aircraft noise, in consultation with the FAA and other participants. Recommendations approved and endorsed by a majority of Working Group members (when a quorum of at least three representatives from each major political jurisdiction – Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia – are present) will be forwarded periodically by the Airports Authority to the Federal Aviation Administration or other applicable entities for consideration.

The Working Group is designed to inject broad-based community input into noise-related discussions, and to move the noise discussion beyond the airing of individual and neighborhood complaints toward a cooperative effort to identify practical solutions and recommend those solutions to the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority for submission to the Federal Aviation Administration or other applicable entity for consideration. Therefore, the Working Group's meetings will be technically focused working sessions rather than public participation forums, with discussion participation limited to the Working Group's membership and official advisers, as outlined above. Dear Mr. Metruck, Commissioners Bowman, Calkins, Cho, Felleman, and Steinbruck:

We acknowledge the concern of the Port Commissioners regarding the terrible effects of the Covid 19 Pandemic on our society, economy and health. Some notable efforts are being made to alleviate suffering. One high risk group however, remains completely ignored. We would appreciate hearing from the Port of Seattle and Commissioners how they intend to address the residents living around Sea-Tac Airport who were already suffering deteriorating health effects from noise and emissions before the arrival of Covid 19.

Many of us have read multiple articles describing the citizenry hardest hit by Covid 19 which includes people of color and the elderly with underlying medical conditions. Burien has a large minority population and growing number of retirees already plagued by health disparities typical of airport communities such as sleep deprivation, diabetes, asthma, lung disease and cancer. What is notably *missing* from the Airport's web pages describing their Covid 19 safeguards for travelers is <u>what</u> mitigation is planned for the vulnerable environmental justice population and others with compromised health conditions in Burien. Of course, the City is concerned about all of its residents, but knowing that some people are more susceptible to higher morbidity and mortality due to the virus **because** of these **existing** conditions should compel some action.

The principles of protecting the most vulnerable are already codified in Executive Order (EO) 12898 Environmental Justice, the same EO recognized by the State Board of Health in 2001 as necessary to apply to residents that are disproportionately affected by pollution from Sea-Tac Airport and at much higher average risk.

Because Burien is disproportionately vulnerable with pre-existing health disparities and less likely to survive Covid 19, Burien City Councilmembers, along with our Burien Airport Committee members, would very much like to have a conversation with Port Commissioners and staff to share ideas about this timely topic of mitigating these risk factors.
