



Council Goals: Code Compliance Future

- New code compliance program coordinator
- Perform code compliance activities
- Coordinate interagency and interdepartmental action team
- Provide education and outreach on code compliance
- Organize, attend, and conduct community meetings to present information and to gather public participation, sentiment, opinion, and suggestions; analyze and present results of public input
- Represent the City at community meetings and regional forums

Redevelopment



Council Goals: 154th Street Redevelopment

- 1. Plan and construct infrastructure improvements that increase viability of commercial development
 - Anticipated infrastructure investment of \$21M through 2018
- 2. Continue to pursue development opportunities
 - Planning Urban Land Institute Technical Assistance Panel Fall 2013
- 3. Incorporate input from SeaTac residents, adjacent businesses and development community

Sound Transit Improvements (1-3 years)

- In station area: Station, parking garage, surface parking, passenger pick-up/drop-off, public plaza, connections to local and Rapid Ride bus service, public art, sidewalks, bike lanes and new traffic signal
- Beyond station area: Improve I-5/Military Road/South 200th intersection

Council Goals: Angle Lake Station *Urban Planning*

- Urban Land Institute Technical Assistance Panel-March 2013
 - Explore market realities for redevelopment of the Angle Lake Station area
 - Likely uses
 - Investments, incentives and strategies to spur redevelopment
- Strategic redevelopment plan for Angle Lake Station area-Late 2013
- Both will guide City's near-term action plan


Major Projects: 28th/24th Avenue



28th/24th

Cost/Benefit

- \$20M project
 - \$3.4M mitigation from Sound Transit
 - \$2.5M FMSIB Grant
 - Seeking other funding sources
- Opens/enhances access to vacant port property and other redevelopment opportunities
- Enhances connection from and to airport, business park




Major Projects: Angle Lake Phase Two

Major Projects: Military Road South Improvement

•\$7.4 million project will reconstruct a portion of Military Road from 166th to 176th

Project will provide for drainage, bicycle, and pedestrian facilities.
Design scheduled to be complete spring of 2013 and construction completed by end of 2014



Major Projects: New Fire Station

New station 45 on S.
200th Street is under design
Cost approximately \$4M pending final design



Other Initiatives: Fire Services Contractual Consolidation

- Developing plan for potential contractual consolidation of fire services with Kent Regional Fire Authority (RFA)
- Joint City/RFA task force scheduled to make recommendation to Council in June/July 2013 timeframe
- Current contract for services includes: administrative, fire marshal, public education, training, fleet maintenance

Other Initiatives: Solid Waste

Solid Waste franchise

- RFP on street in April/May 2013
- Finalize contract in July/August 2013
- Bring to Council in August/September 2013
- Start new contract June 2014

Other Initiatives: Comprehensive Planlpdate

2012 Work Completed:

- Develop scope of work
- Review checklists from Growth Management Services and Puget Sound Regional Council
- Incorporate new growth forecast and Census data
- Assess how new data affects other elements

Other Initiatives: Major Comprehensive Planupdate

2013 Schedule:

- Coordinate Land Use, Transportation and Utilities Element amendments
- Develop Housing amendments based on 2012 affordable housing work
- Coordinate Human Services amendments with Housing amendments
- Begin public involvement process

Other Initiatives: Major Comprehensive Planupdate

2014 Schedule:

- Draft amendments to other plan elements
- Review amendments with Planning Commission and City Council
- Continue public involvement
- Environmental Impact Statement process
- Public hearing
- Council action

Other Initiatives: Communities Putting Prevention to Work

- Access to corner stores policies and codes
- SeaTac walking map
- Safe and complete streets plan for pedestrians and bicyclists



Other Initiatives: Community Building Committee

- New seven-member committee
- Formed by City Council in 2012
- Work to bring community together on important issues
- Advise the City Council
- More than 20 people applied
- Ready to seat appointees subject to Council confirmation

Other Initiatives: Legislative Agenda

- SR 509 extension
- South 28th/24th Avenue
- Transportation funding
- Infrastructure funding (Public Works Trust Fund, etc.)
- Public records
