OPERATING PROCEDURES FOR THE HIGHLINE FORUM

Purpose

The Highline Forum provides Southwest King County municipalities and educational governing bodies and the Port of Seattle with the opportunity to share information, interact with outside speakers and other governmental organizations and work in partnership on initiatives that benefit the residents of Southwest King County.

The Highline Forum is not a formal decision-making body or an inter-local agency. Any action taken by the Forum is based on consensus. Consensus-based actions are the product of discussions among the members and a final call for adoption by the co-chairs. In the event there is opposition to an action by one or more members, the question of adoption is left to the judgment of the co-chairs.

Membership

One elected representative and one senior administrator serve on the Forum from the following jurisdictions or institutions:

- City of SeaTac
- City of Burien
- City of Des Moines
- City of Tukwila
- City of Normandy Park

- City of Federal Way
- Highline Public Schools
- Highline Community College
- Port of Seattle

Both Federal Way and Highline Community College, because of their organizational structure, have the option of having just one representative serve on the Forum. Each jurisdiction or institution also designates one elected representative alternate and one senior administrator alternate to attend and participate when either of the primary members is unable to attend.

Prior to the March meeting, each jurisdiction or institution will designate their Forum representative for the year. If there is agreement, new jurisdictions or institutions can formally be invited to become members of the Forum at any time.

Responsibilities of Participants

At the November meeting, members determine the themes of the following year's meetings, the timing of when the meetings occur and which member jurisdiction or institution will serve as the meeting host(s). Every effort is made to provide an opportunity for each member jurisdiction or institution to host at least one meeting every two years.

Forum members serving as meeting hosts take lead responsibility for facilitating the meeting. As hosts, the Forum members are expected to draft the agenda, secure any outside speakers and handle meeting logistics (securing meeting space, etc.). Forum members are solely responsible for any expenses related to the meetings they host.

The Port of Seattle will serve as the lead disseminators of all information connected to the Forum and its meetings and assist the meeting hosts with guidance on organizational logistics.

Meetings

• Frequency

The Forum meets four times a year. Meetings occur the fourth Wednesday of March, May, September and November. One exception – if Thanksgiving falls on the fourth week in November, the Forum meets on the third Wednesday in November. Meetings begin at 2:30 PM and conclude typically at 4:30 PM.

Co-Chairs

The Forum has two co-chairs – an elected representative from the Port (Port Co-chair) and an elected representative from one of the jurisdictions or institutions (Community Co-chair). On the day of the meeting, co-chairs are tasked with facilitating the meeting: introducing speakers and topics, making sure adequate time is given to all agenda items and proposing and handling any action items.

The Port Co-chair is selected by the Port of Seattle Commission and announced prior to the March meeting. The Community Co-Chair is selected by the members of the Forum at the March meeting. If the Port Co-chair cannot attend a meeting, the Port elected representative alternate will serve as the Port Co-chair. If the Community Co-chair cannot attend a meeting, the elected representative from the Forum jurisdiction or institution hosting the meeting will serve as the Community Co-chair.

Agenda Structure

Roughly half of each meeting is dedicated to the theme of the meeting with the other half divided between time reserved for the member host to provide an update on a topic of their choice, as well as time for all members to share and discuss emerging issues.

Members receive advance copies of the meeting agenda and are able to provide input and suggest changes prior to the agenda's finalization. If there is interest, some meetings can be held jointly with other governmental organizations.

Additional Administrative Items

For purposes of conducting business, a majority of members present constitutes a quorum. Discussions at meetings include both elected representatives and senior administrators. However, only elected representatives are able to take part in the final decision-making process regarding a potential action.

All meetings are open to the public and noticed in the appropriate Southwest King County media outlets prior to each meeting. Time is set aside at the start of each meeting for the public to provide comments on any of the meeting's agenda items. Members of the public who wish to speak are asked to sign-up in advance and are granted up to three minutes of time.

Since the Forum is not a formal decision-making body or an inter-local agency, minutes are not kept of the meeting's proceedings.

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SR 509 Extension Coalition Draft 2/8/2013

Purpose:

Support a broader, stronger, louder coalition to support completion of the extension of SR 509.

Background:

The extension of SR 509 has been in the planning stages for many years and has unwavering support from state legislators, municipalities, the Port of Seattle, business and labor interests in the area. A lack of funding has been identified as the primary obstacle to creating the approximately \$800 million project. However, various transportation revenue packages are being considered in the 2013 Washington State Legislature that could bring much-needed financing to the project. In addition, an "optimization" study being conducted by the Washington State Department of Transportation on both SR 167 and SR 509 is expected to provide recommendations to the Washington State Legislature on phasing and funding for both projects. The draft of that study is due out in March 2013 with a final in June 2013. Therefore, a reenergized coalition for SR 509 could enjoy a long-awaited resurgence of interest in the project.

Proposal:

State legislators have advised that a broader group of voices to include local business owners and citizens supporting SR 509 would benefit lobbying efforts. A concerted effort to identify those supporters should commence immediately. To maintain connectivity with supporters and invite more supporters, a few simple communication and involvement mechanisms should also be put into place.

Budget:

Although a budget hasn't been developed, a back-of-the-napkin estimate is provided below. Key stakeholders would be asked to contribute a minimum amount, either actual or in kind, to support the involvement and communication pieces as well as offering their time to canvas for additional supporters.

The Forum will be asked to support the efforts proposed by:

- Contacting business and labor interests to gather endorsements for materials including any quotes from major leaders. Efforts should be coordinated through one person so there isn't double teaming. The City of SeaTac is willing to take the role of tracking who is planning to contact whom.
- 2. Employing their contacts with residents to provide information on the project and its importance, ask them to subscribe to the website and find citizens able/willing to represent the project to elected officials and others in their communities.
- 3. Providing minimal funding or in-kind support for communications efforts. Participation is anticipated for the 2013 and 2014 Washington State Legislatures.
- 4. Signing up to participate as speakers in the speakers' bureau and identifying opportunities for presentations.
- 5. Engaging in lobbying efforts for the project at the state and local level.

I-5/SR 509 Extension Coalition Highline Forum 3/27/2013

Purpose:

Support a broader, stronger, louder coalition to support completion of the extension of SR 509.

Background:

The extension of SR 509 has been in the planning stages for many years and has unwavering support from state legislators, municipalities, the Port of Seattle, business and labor interests in the area. A lack of funding has been identified as the primary obstacle to completing this \$1.2 billion project. However, the 2013 Washington State Legislature is discussing a potential transportation revenue package that could bring much-needed financing to the project. In addition, an "optimization" study being conducted by the Washington State Department of Transportation on both SR 167 and SR 509 is expected to provide recommendations to the Washington State Legislature on phasing for 4-lane build-outs of both projects. The draft of that study is due out in March 2013 with a final in June 2013. Therefore, a re-energized coalition for SR 509 could enjoy a long-awaited resurgence of interest in the project.

Proposal:

State legislators have advised that a broader group of voices to include local business owners and citizens supporting SR 509 would benefit lobbying efforts. A concerted effort to identify those supporters should commence immediately. To maintain connectivity with supporters and invite more supporters, a few simple communication and involvement mechanisms should also be put into place. Additionally, it is likely that the 509 Coalition will want to join with a parallel SR 167 Completion Coalition on certain lobbying and messaging efforts, and will want to enlist Congressman Adam Smith (D-9th Dist.) to play a more high-profile role in assisting at the federal level.

Budget:

Although a budget hasn't been developed, a back-of-the-napkin estimate is provided below. Key stakeholders would be asked to contribute a minimum amount, either actual or in kind, to support the involvement and communication pieces as well as offering their time to canvas for additional supporters.

Dear SR 509/I-5 supporter:

The State Legislature has begun a conversation about a transportation revenue package. This has kick started the first major effort to complete SR 509 in years. In the current transportation revenue proposals, the SR 509/SR 167/I-5 corridor, known collectively as the "Puget Sound Gateway Project" is in line to receive \$1 billion of funding in the House Transportation Committee's "Connecting Washington" package.

Legislators and leadership in the House and Senate need to hear your voice on the importance of the corridor for freight mobility to our ports from our warehousing districts and from our farms to our markets. The transportation revenue package still needs more support in the Legislature—and you can help.

Our key message for SR 509 is: Finish what we've started. Both 167 and 509 have sat for decades partially completed. Yet they offer huge returns on investment. Four counties along Interstate 5 support 55 percent of Washington's state population and 61 percent of its jobs—yet that vitality is threatened by congestion.

Part 150 Study Schedule Going Forward:

- The week of April 8th Airmail (Sea-Tac's community newsletter) is sent out notifying the community of the impending beginning of the Part 150 public comment period and the date of the open house/public hearing
- April 15th The official public comment period starts a number of public outreach efforts (press releases, emails, newspaper ads, etc.) will be used by the Port to spread the word about the various ways the public can provide comments
- **April 15th** The latest copies of the Part 150 document are made available at publicly accessible locations
- May 15th –Part 150 open house/public hearing at Cedarhurst Elementary School in Burien
- May 30th Public comment period ends
- June 25th/July 9th/July 23rd Port Commission briefing and approval of Part 150 Study
- July 30th –Final Part 150 submitted to the FAA
- March 2014 –FAA expected to issue Record of Approval
