Program Background

- Launched in 2020 to build equity-based partnerships with near-port communities
- Three primary programs:
 - Economic Recovery
 - Environmental Grants
 - WMBE Small Business
- Deep community engagement and capacity building especially with BIPOC communities
- Multi-Year Funding options launched in Round II

 - 10-week training program providing selected cohort group with robust curriculum and one-on-one mentorship
- Advanced PortGen Workshop Series
 - 6-week program focusing on government contracting fundamentals and connections to technical assistance resources



Environmental Program Project Examples

- African Young Dreamers Empowerment
 Program (\$60,000 funding over three years)
 - Working with Black and African immigrant youth to steward and restore parks in Federal Way.
 Conducting park clean up and invasive plant removal, as well as planting native trees.
- EarthGen (\$60,000 funding over three years)
 - Working with Highline School District students, teachers, and families to develop and installing Green Stormwater Infrastructure (GSI) such as rain gardens, native plant gardens, and bioswales.
 Projects will take place in SeaTac, Burien, and Des Moines.



Environmental Grants Program Cycle 1 Outputs

- Funded Organizations: 14
- BIPOC Led Organizations: 6
- Trees Planted: 654
- Volunteer Hours: 2,935
- Educational and Training Hours: 3,176



Program Successes

- Community Liaison Program and Community Advisors
- Increase in equity and accessibility through hybrid meeting models
- Developed meaningful new partnerships with local communities and organizations through engagement



Program Challenges

- Contracts are reimbursable creating barriers to entry for smaller orgs or community groups without cash reserves
- 3:1 match for the Environmental Grants Program
- Complex contracting process



Programmatic Improvements in Cycle III



Environmental Program

- Pre-application workshops and recipient site tours
- Adding 30 minutes to interviews needing language interpretation
- Technical Assistance sessions which will be recorded and posted on VendorConnect.

Programmatic Improvements Continued

Economic Recovery Program

- Increase outreach and weekly technical support
- Cohort innovation & learning
- Materials updated, and revised language to be more user friendly
- Two step application process



Community Capacity Building Contract

- Awarded to Siliana Consulting, a 100% WMBE firm and subconsultant OneVibe Media, a 100% MBE, both based in South King County
- Support for grassroots Community Based Organizations (CBOs)
- A focus on City engagement throughout the grant cycle
- Continuation and expansion of the Community Liaison Program
- Authentic storytelling, recipient support and networking opportunities.

Next Steps

- Cycle 3 funding launched on September 15, 2022 for Environmental and Economic Recovery Programs
- Program Evaluation RFP to be released this fall and completed by May 2023
- Program evaluation results and Commission re-authorization for Phase II SKCCIF in 2023
- Ongoing collaboration with SKC Cities
