

Satellite Transit System

Sea-Tac's completely automated Satellite Transit System is one of the most successful people-movers in the nation. With cars departing from each stop about every two minutes, the STS consists of 9,050 feet of underground railway which connects the main passenger terminal with the North and South Satellites, as well as Concourse B and Concourse C.

Riding the Trains

The Satellite Transit System has two separate loops. The south loop begins in the main terminal on the transit level below the TWA counter, with stops at the South Satellite and the end of Concourse B. The north loop begins in the main terminal on the transit level below the United Airlines counter, with stops at the North Satellite and the end of Concourse C.

For your convenience, there is also a shuttle available at the two transit level stations which connects the two loops.

Banking Services/583-6644

A branch of Seattle-First National Bank is located in the center of the main terminal building. Hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Foreign currency exchange booths are located in the terminal area.

Nursery

Conveniently located on the ticket level of the main terminal by the gift shop, the airport nursery lounge is available for child care, changing and feeding. There is no charge for chairs, couches and cribs.

Restaurants/433-5622

The Carvery Restaurant, located in the center of the main terminal building, offers elegant dining and a dramatic view of flight arrivals and departures. The Carvery can accommodate groups of up to 30 diners. Hours: 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and 5 p.m. to 11 p.m. Monday through Friday; 5 p.m. to 11 p.m. Saturday, and 4:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. Sunday.

There are also coffee shops serving light meals, snacks and beverages in the main terminal and in the North and South Satellite buildings. Hours: 6 a.m. to 1 a.m. daily.

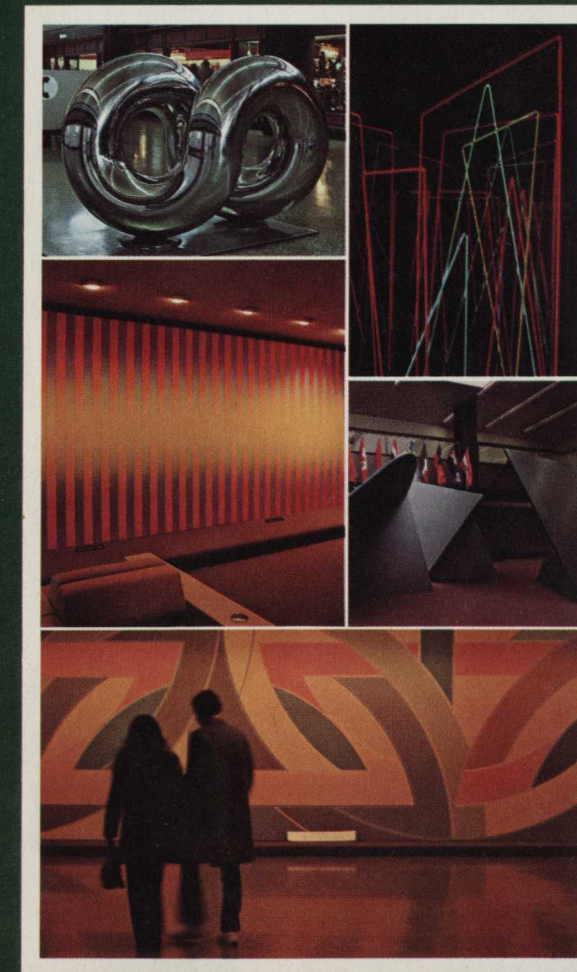
